Ask about any which you are not sure how to pronounce, wonder about the meaning of, etc. (The ones in italics are not so important to know the meaning of).

Test each other on the same words in other ways:

- say both words on one line and see if your partner can count the number of syllables
- pronounce both words on one line and see if your partner can explain how the pronunciation is different
- choose one line and see if your partner can pronounce both words (differently)
- say the name of a category and see how many words your partner can say that match it (with B words and words not on the worksheet that have the same consonant cluster also being okay)
