

Past numbers trivia board game narrative tenses review

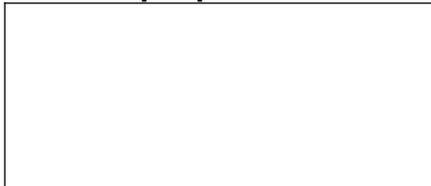
Each put a counter (e.g. an eraser) on the START square. Tell your partner what kind of square you are on (Past Simple, Past Continuous or Past Perfect) and they will take a card from that pack and read it out. Past Continuous cards are the narrowest, Past Perfect cards are the widest, and Past Simple are the medium-width cards. You have up to six tries to get exactly the right answer, with six points if you get it right on your first guess, five points if you get it right on your second guess, etc. After each wrong guess, your partner will give you a hint about how far you are wrong like "It's a lot more", "It's quite a lot less" and "It's a little higher" until they guess exactly the right number. All guesses must be in full sentences ("He played Dracula 100 times", etc).

Useful language for giving hints			
(That's close but)	it's (actually) the real number is	a lot/ much/ far quite a lot slightly/ a little/ a bit very slightly/ a tiny bit	more/ higher/ longer/ more often. less/ lower/ shorter.

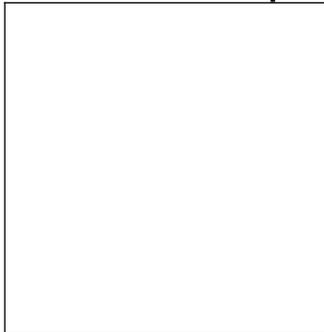
When you get the correct answer, you can move that many squares clockwise, e.g. four squares if your third guess was correct. Continue until you get all the way around the board or the teacher stops the game. If you run out of cards, use the same ones again.

Past Continuous	<p style="text-align: center;">Past numbers trivia board game narrative tenses review</p> <p><i>Try to answer trivia questions about past numbers and move clockwise around the board, with how many squares you move depending on how quickly you guess <u>exactly</u> the right number:</i></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - first guess is right = move six squares - second guess is correct = move five squares - third guess is correct = move four squares - fourth guess is correct = move three squares - fifth guess is correct = move two squares - sixth guess is correct = move one square <p><i>If you need more than six guesses, you have to give up and stay on the same square. Between each guess, your partner will give you hints about how wrong you are like "The real number is much long" and "Actually, it's slightly less often".</i></p> <p><i>When someone has gone all around the board or your teacher stops the game, try to analyse the differences between the three tenses used in this game.</i></p>			Past Continuous

How long had airships been flying across the Atlantic when the Hindenburg airship disaster happened? They had been flying across the Atlantic for 9 years.	How long had there been slavery in the USA when Lincoln proclaimed all slaves to be free? There had been slavery for 244 years.
How long had Winston Churchill been a member of parliament when he became British prime minister during the Second World War? He had been one for 40 years.	How long had the Second World War been over when Japanese soldier Hiroo Onoda surrendered? It had been over for 29 years.
How long had New Zealand women had the right to vote when Swiss women achieved the same thing? They had had that right for 78 years.	How long had William Henry Harrison been President of the United States when he died? He had been president for 31 days.
How long had the Ottoman Empire existed when it ended in 1920? It had existed for 469 years.	How long had John Dingle been a US Senator when he retired in 2015? He had been one for 59 years.
