

## **There is There are plus countable nouns games for young learners**

*Play the game or games below which your teacher tells you to. Your teacher will tell you if, when and/ or how you can use the table on the next page below to help.*

### **Game 1**

Listen to a “How many...?” question about the classroom from your teacher or from a student. Run and touch those things as you count them, then race to sit down.

### **Game 2**

Throw a ball at something in this room and ask “How many... are there in this room?” about that thing. You will get the number of points of the number in the answer to that question, e.g. six points if the answer is “There are six posters” after you hit a poster. You get no points if someone has already asked the same question.

### **Game 3**

Ask your partner a personal “How many... are there... your...?” You will get the number of points of the number in the answer, e.g. four points if your partner says “There are four chairs in my kitchen” if you ask about that. If the answer is “I don’t know”, you get no points.

### **Game 4**

Ask your partner “How many...?” questions. You get one point for each “I don’t know” answer. Each question must be about a different thing and about a different place. If that question is impossible to answer, e.g. because your partner doesn’t have a brother, you don’t get any points.

### **Game 5**

Think of a personal “How many... are there ... your...?” question and write down the number which you think your partner will say. Ask the question and compare their answer to what you wrote. If you were right, you get that many points.

### **Game 6**

Ask personal “How many...?” questions to find things which are the same for you and for your partner, for example that you both have two brothers.

### **Game 7**

Ask personal “How many...?” questions to find things which are more for you than for your partner, for example that you have three lamps and your partner only has two.

*When your teacher stops you, ask about anything in the table below which you aren’t sure about, working together to ask and answer questions using those words each time. Then play the different game above which your teacher tells you to.*
